I hope that by the time of the October meeting (the AGM), we will be able to have a definite time and place for this group to start. Latin is not the only idea for a new group that has been suggested to me. Do you like good classic films? Would you enjoy sharing your viewing with others? Eleven people, three from outside, but eight Square Dancers from Buckingham, all members of the U3A, were privileged to be invited to our twin town of Mouvaux, near Lille, for the weekend of May 20-22nd 2011. We journeyed there by Eurostar which we found remarkably smooth and easy, much less hassle than an airport. We were greeted at the Town Hall with coffee and cakes when we arrived and then taken to the Theatre for a rehearsal and a picnic supper.

We were to participate in a Gala de Dance to celebrate the 50th Anniversary of dance section of The Jean d'Arc Association of Sports and Culture. We were hosted by members of both the Twinning and the Dance Associations. Valerie Shaw, who is the Secretary of the Buckingham Twinning Association, had organised everything as well as dancing in our "show".

The theme of the Gala was "Stamps" and our contribution included the music of four songs referring to love letters. The technical side of presenting the music and having to show ourselves from one side only on a stage, was unnerving, but our two performances, one on the Saturday evening and the second on Sunday afternoon, received rapturous applause, with cheers and stamping feet. The audience was very kind and welcoming to our group and enthusiastically joined in the singing of the last song with which they were familiar.

Our five hosts gave us a home—cooked lunch on both days and comfortable beds and breakfasts. Other people were roped in to help transport us around and also to give us a guided tour of the old part of Lille. They were brilliant hosts and forgot nothing, we even had our own lockable dressing room at the theatre. We did not have to spend any money once we had arrived. Both the routes walked and the bus journeys introduced us to parts of MK most of us had never seen. This was quite a complicated venture to organise, as we did not want to waste too much time waiting for buses, and, of course, each walk had to end near to a suitable eating place. We were not disappointed in either aspect. Milton Keynes does have a remarkable bus service, all-being sometimes on rather old and shaky buses.

We never had to wait longer than 20 minutes for a bus, drivers were always friendly and the buses appeared to be well used in whichever estates we were driven through. One word of warning: the MK bus timetable is printed twice a year, in April and October. There are very few changes but we did get caught out once. A walk planned for March was "rained off" and when we tried again in June, the expected bus did not turn up and we had to walk for another 10 minutes to Bletchley bus station. The bus we had wanted turned up there but, on enquiry, the driver said the route had been changed in April, as he cheerfully handed me a free copy of the new timetable.

As for the "suitable eating places", well, we have never been disappointed. From good basic food at very reasonable prices to the occasional exceptional food at a little over the average price, you name the area and we can recommend a pub.

We are now over halfway through our programme for 2011 and so far things have gone to plan; we have been fortunate with the weather on our outings and our speakers have all presented us with an interesting and inspiring range of historical information about Buckingham and its environs. The group can now claim to be more knowledgeable about the Drovers who passed through Buckingham, The Old Gaol, English Churches and Milton Keynes. Professor Clarke, from the University of Buckingham, made us more aware of the growth of Buckingham and Brackley and why they fared so differently through the ages and one of our members fascinated us with a talk on the types of theatre which residents of Buckingham would have enjoyed through the Middle Ages to Elizabethan times – we even acted out some of the roles ourselves. Our visits have led us a little further afield than Buckingham itself and again we have been very lucky at being taken around by guides who evidently have a passion for their subject. Two of our guided walks were led by U3A members; Linda Shimer took us around Winslow and Lilian McDonald pointed out the history of Olney, particularly its links to the Olney hymn writers Cowper and Newton. The group was very lucky to visit RAF Halton which included a tour of the Rothschild Mansion, which was recently used for the filming of *The King's Speech*, and the aircraft museum. We also enjoyed a tour of Disraeli's home at Hughenden Manor and saw why Hitler made it one of his main targets during the war. At the Buckinghamshire Railway Centre at Quainton we were taught the skills of sorting the post on the overnight postal train as well as being able to view Churchill and Eisenhower's carriage from which they directed operations during World War II. We hope that our good luck with the weather continues for the remainder of the year especially for our trip to the Hook Norton Brewery in November where I know some members will be hoping to enjoy free samples of the local brew. German Diskussionsgruppe



Our July holiday, booked with a German travel firm and spent in the company of German travellers, presented us with a marvellous opportunity to practise our language skills and get to know a new part of the country at the same time. Prior to the holiday we spent a few days in Berlin, a city full of interesting places to visit and one which has changed a great dramatically over the past 25 years.

This was also where we eventually joined the coach to Mecklenburg-Vorpommern, a federal state which lies to the north of the capital and borders on the Baltic coast. We stayed in the small town of Neubrandenburg, still surrounded by its walls and ramparts and four very striking town gates. Included excursions took us into the

countryside and an attractive area known as the Mecklenburgische Seenplatte where there are over one hundred lakes. We had a boat trip on one of them, the Müritzer See, the second largest in Germany after Lake Constance. Another excursion took us to Poland and the seventh largest city in that country, Stettin (Szczecin), where a delightful local guide gave us an excellent tour. Finally, on our free days, the Buckingham contingent caught the train to the old Hanseatic city of Stralsund and the pretty university town of Greifswald, home of the romantic German artist, Caspar David Friedrich. The whole expedition proved to be relatively inexpensive,

and our objectives in undertaking it were successfully achieved. Next year we face the promising prospect of a private tour in Bavaria.

The German Diskussionsgruppe meets on the 1st and 3rd Fridays of the month, speaks only German and discusses a variety of topical themes. We also read about Germany and the Germans from our source book "45 Stunden Deutschland", which helps to inform us about German institutions, history and social organisations. We also relax on occasional DVD evenings to watch a German film. We would welcome any German speakers who might wish to join us.



A Trip Back to the Past and into the Future - Fact or Fiction?

In June, Geoff and I went to London to do some family history research but found that we had entered into a strange dark place!

On arriving at our Hotel (Docklands), we entered through a barrier arm and into a security area we had not seen the like of before. Hardly any people, (apart from in our hotel). Buildings going up to the sky, but seemingly uninhabited by humans. Buildings full of lighted rooms, but also full of machines – computers, servers or



what? Other buildings that had no windows, just walls that looked like metal – what was in them? There was a pleasant little canal or drill with little bridges but not for cars, just for pedestrians who obviously are only allowed out at 9.00 a.m. and 5.00 p.m. A strange place.

Things got weirder as we started to investigate our surroundings and went onto the DLR (Docklands Light Railways) and there were trains, or at least carriages – no engines and no drivers. We moved on to Brick Lane and found a very narrow road full of Indian restaurants and take-aways – again the language (and signage) was different and we felt as it we had come back from the 21st century to the 19th. Off Brick Lane is Princelet Street, formerly Princes Street. We had come to look at the style of houses that were once owned by rich weaver merchants and their workers. Some are in great condition and some have their, apparently original, large glass windows.

Finally at the end of our stay, we went to Canary Wharf – once again a feeling of change of Century. Beautiful new buildings, shopping arcades and converted warehouses. Lots of restaurants and coffee bars and a great feeling of wealth and happiness and also of safety.

If the story of our visit to London sounds odd with the changing feelings, you should try to trace your past and see how it feels also to come into touch with the (possible) future!!
